#### ReLeaf

# ACCOMPLISHMENTS

#### **Climate Change**

A total of 434,206 trees were planted under Tree Canada programs last year, potentially sequestering a total of 253,517 tonnes of CO<sub>2</sub> from our atmosphere. Part of this amount included 14 certified "carbon neutral" conferences which accounted for 16,553 trees. The carbon produced to travel and hold these conferences was offset by the trees planted by the Foundation. These conferences included:


